

The Perspective Plan of the DB YaR National Forum is a comprehensive strategic guide, created collaboratively since February 2019. The Forum engaged all provinces in ongoing dialogue to shape the future of Salesian Ministry for Young at Risk (YaR) in India.

During the Annual General Body Meeting in Mumbai on September 20, 2019, over **60+ delegates** prioritized key issues for the next five years. This inclusive process involved extensive back-and-forth communication from July 2023, from YaR Leaders orientation and is continuing, ensuring the planned implementation of programs.

Thus, progress was monitored via Google Forms, allowing real-time assessment and adaptability to the needs of at-risk youth. The plan embodies strategic vision, inclusivity, and collective impact.



Homelink Network

The Homelink Network, launched in 2002 by DB YaR Forum, supports at-risk youth across India. It employs data-driven decision-making and technology to provide timely interventions. With 8 Hubs and multiple Nodes, it connects **87 member organizations** through the Homelink



Child MISS web tool, housing data on over 398,141 children. Coordinated from Delhi, it covers 20 states with regional hubs in major cities. The network aims to safeguard vulnerable youth's well-being and future prospects through informed, collaborative efforts.

From Homelink Child MISS to Homelink DIGI

Child MISS, an online platform for managing services for at-risk youth, is used by over **87 NGOs.** It's evolving into **Homelink DIGI**, developed with Elait IT and Cateina Technologies. This upgrade reflects the network's adaptability and commitment to supporting vulnerable children.

Development of the Homelink DIGI

Homelink DIGI is advancing with the integration of Child PPa and facial recognition API. Data corrections and migration is ongoing, while Power BI templates is near completion. The system features live dashboards, cloud storage, and AI integration, enhancing child protection measures. Virtual sessions and extensive testing ensure functionality and user acceptance of this innovative platform.

National Training and Launch of Homelink DIGI

DB YaR Forum hosted a "Digital Innovation and Social Transformation" training in Goa from January 17-19, 2024. The event, led by Elait team, aimed to empower 30 Hub Directors, Coordinators, and delegates from 11 provinces with digital skills.

Homelink DIGI Testing by HLK Team

A comprehensive series of User Acceptance Testing (UTA) sessions has been initiated and is currently ongoing. By focusing on key areas of the tool and application, the UTA testing aims to enhance reliability and functionality for optimal performance.

Training for NGOs and Civil Society Organizations

Bangalore: WeLive Foundation to adopt Homelink DIGI for Aftercare program.

Chennai: Presented to 32 MSW students from 5 colleges.

Coimbatore: Introduced at Silver Jubilee Symposium to 250 members.

Delhi: Demonstrated to 184 participants from 15 NGOs at Don Bosco Ashalayam.

Mumbai: Raised awareness on digitalization; presented to FMA Sisters' National Coordinator for potential nationwide expansion.

Homelink Training in Chennai



Don Bosco for Migrants

Assistance for Manipur Kukis

Support was provided for the Manipur Kukis arriving in Bombay, Chennai, Bangalore, and Delhi. DB4M Desks in these provinces coordinated with Kukki student unions. Thanks to the provinces of IND, ING, INS, INM, INK, and INB for their outreach efforts.

National Migrant Workshop



The National Migrant Workshop was convened on July 11th and 12th, 2023, at Nitika, Kolkata, with 40 delegates participating. Discussions centered around the themes of 'Know how and Act how'. Strategies were outlined to enhance connectivity between destinations and sources, promote the Migrant Labour Helpline, conduct monthly capacity-building sessions, arrange migrant Immersion programs, and ensure project sustainability. Special recognition and gratitude were accorded to the INC Provincial, Economer, and Administrator of Nitika for their invaluable support.



Migrant Forum Formation

The Province Migrant Level formed to raise Forums were awareness on the need for young migrants to have access to healthcare, education, and other essential services. In each province, together DB4M brought government representatives, nongovernmental organizations, and



CSO leaders to collaborate on providing support systems for migrants. As a result, these forums have been established across all provinces, involving various migrant partners and stakeholders. Additionally, each forum maintains a WhatsApp group to reach out to migrants during times of need and emergencies. Nearly 200 partners are collaborating with DB4M in India to support the migrant ministry.

Migrant Labour Helpline

The Migrant Labour Helpline (9642372372) employs 10 staff members proficient in various languages to assist callers across different provinces in India. A systematic monthly online monitoring and evaluation process assesses the effectiveness of language assistance and generates action reports. Additionally, communication is facilitated through the DB4M WhatsApp group, where offline mediation is carried out to address

migrants' grievances, redressals, and crises.

The DB4M migrant labour helpline team, which includes staff members, volunteers, well-wishers, and province-level migrant forum members, actively engages themselves with these issues, working collaboratively within their respective provinces to find resolutions.





Migrant Immersion Programmes

The Migrant Exposure Program took place in Chennai, Udaipur, and Ahmednagar, aiming to provide DB4M Salesians and participants with an in-depth understanding of migrant issues and services. In Chennai, on September 2nd and 3rd, 2023, DB4M staff interacted with various migrant NGOs, unorganized trade unions, sectoral workers, and religious organizations. This interaction had a profound impact on the participants, who also visited brick kilns, construction sites, and manufacturing sectors to gain a broader perspective. The programme continued in Udaipur and Ahmednagar on November 7th and 8th, 2023, with visits to the Tata Institute of Social Sciences (Ajeevika Bureau) in Ahmednagar and the Rajasthan, both of which extend vital migrant services. These experiences collectively enriched the DB4M Salesians' understanding of the challenges and support systems available for migrants.

Data Collection & Surveys

DB4M organized training sessions for data collection using the Destination Form for INS, INB, Rourkela, Bihar, and UP. The provinces of ING, IND, and INS gathered and compiled 2,523 sourced data entries. This data, identifying potential young migrants, was entered into Google Studio for subsequent follow-up and additional counselling. Data collection efforts in source areas were particularly organized in migrant-prone Salesian Parishes of Jharkhand, Chhattisgarh, and Odisha in INN and ING-Satgaon. These efforts involved collaboration with parish priests, catechists, and volunteers. Moreover, on August 9th, the DB4M desks collaborated with the UN Salesian representative to conduct the World Survey on Migrants.

DB4M Monthly Capacity Building

Knowledge building on Migration was the major focus of capacity building for the Salesians and staff members. Monthly online capacitybuilding sessions were scheduled for the second Friday of each month,



from 10 am to 11 am. The themes explored during these sessions included the Right to Education Act, the Unorganized Social Security Act, the Interstate Migrant Act, and the Building and Other Construction Workers Act, with a focus on registration procedures and associated benefits. Additionally, the sessions addressed the intersection of migrants and trade unions, highlighting critical issues. These sessions provided valuable insights into significant legislative frameworks and social policies affecting various sectors by Labour experts.

Comprehensive Legal Framework

Recognizing the lack of specific legal provisions for this vulnerable workforce, a committee was established to draft a comprehensive law tailored to address their needs. DB4M actively participated in formulating this legal framework, with a specific focus on migrant workers. The North Zone consultation, at the Indian Social Institute in Bangalore, while the South Zone consultation took place at the Railway Mazdoor Union office in Pahar Ganj, New Delhi. DB4M participated in these consultations, contributing to the preparations for the comprehensive law for informal workers.

Safe Migration Campaign in Source States

Migration often occurs in the remote interiors of jungles and villages. DB4M Safe Migration Campaign expanded its efforts to the interior jungles of Jharkhand, Chhattisgarh, Odisha, Uttar Pradesh, Haryana, Goa, and Karnataka to raise awareness and promote safe migration practices.





Collaboration with Bishops, CBCI, CCBI, Caritas, Christian Workers Movement, and Seminaries

DB4M is actively engaged with the Indian church in empowering migrants, collaborating extensively with church bodies across India. Their collaborative programs include "Social Securities for the Elderly and Senior Citizens" by the Christian Workers Movement in Bandra, Mumbai, and visits to Caritas, Pravasi Bandhus projects in Delhi, Jharkhand, Simdega, Salem, Coimbatore, and Bangalore. DB4M also collaborates with ISI New Delhi and the International Catholic Migration Commission (ICMC) in Geneva for events like "Care for Migrants: Scenario and Future Projects" and offers a pastoral course for the Poonamallee Deacons in Chennai.

Collaboration with State, National, and International Bodies

A pivotal aspect of DB4M's advocacy-driven mission. DB4M has engaged in various impactful initiatives, including participating in a workshop focusing on the rights of domestic workers at the Indian Habitat Centre in Delhi, interacting with the ILO office in Delhi, conducting an online meeting with the ILO on migrant corridors, joining the Working Peoples Coalition on ESI at the Constitutional Club in Delhi, attending NREGA Sangharsh Morcha's National Convention at Raja Ram Mohan Roy Memorial Hall in New Delhi, participating in the Worker-Peasant United Front by Mazdoor Ekta Committee, playing an active role in the workshop on Strengthening Social Protection for India's informal sector at ISI Bangalore, contributing to the India Social Forum in Patna, Bihar, collaborating with the Delhi Minority Commission on migrant children's education, participating in a workshop on Sexual Harassment at the Workplace Law at St. Xavier's Hall in Trivandrum, and joining an online webinar on Migration, Gender, and Forced Displacement hosted by the Migration Youth and Children Platform.



Child Friendly Cities Initatives



The Friendly Child Cities Initiative (CFCI) promotes the concept of "child-friendly cities" in Shillong and Dimapur, focusing on children's rights, leadership, and civic engagement. Children, clubs and councils, through collaborate with adults and civil society to engage local government in enacting a childcentered society.






Children Participation

DB YaR Leaders' Orientation







Child Safeguarding Policy

The Don Bosco YaR Child Safeguarding Policy was thoroughly reviewed at the September 2023 Annual General Meeting. A legal team integrated proposals, which were then scrutinized by a 5-member committee. The national team compiled and cross-checked against external documents of Child Protection Policies to ensure that all important themes were addressed. Following thorough conversations, finalized proposals were returned for further refinement.


