

These include vital initiatives such as street presence, rescue operations, safe shelters, and after-care facilities. HOMELINK NEWTORK (HLK)


The Homelink Network, an initiative launched by the DB YaR Forum in 2002, stands as a beacon of hope for at-risk youth across India. Its primary objective is to deliver timely and precise responses to the multifaceted needs of vulnerable young individuals through data management. Central to its approach is the cultivation of a culture rooted in data-driven decision-making and proactive intervention planning, leveraging cutting-edge technology. integrated framework stakeholders to monitor real-time trends and anticipate emerging challenges, ensuring swift and targeted support for youth in distress. Spanning 8 strategic Hubs and multiple Nodes nationwide, the Homelink Network functions as a cohesive ecosystem of over 60 member organizations.



HOMELINK DIGI (Data Intelligence for Global Interface)

The Homelink DIGI continues to evolve strengthening our efforts to protect children and young adults. The Development is the integration of the People Protection App (PPa) with Facial recognition API. It will be enhancing child protection measures and playing a key role in reuniting missing children with their families. This will also help in improving database accuracy by eliminating duplicates and providing exact data visualization and reporting. A significant correction has been made to Child MISS (Child Management Information System & Services) data and migrated to Homelink DIGI database for data storage, documentation and analysis. To validate the platform, the Homelink Team conducted over 180 demo data entry tests. Users Acceptance Testing (UAT) was also carried out to ensure a refined and effective tool for Homelink Network. The DIGI comes with centre-specific customization to mitigate organization requirements.





DEPLOYMENT AND IMPLEMENTATION OF HOMELINK DIGI

The Homelink DIGI is deployed across nodes, enabling module-wise data entry in key sectors. DB YaR Forum has customized it for efficient data management and service improvement. Regular follow-ups and technical support are being provided to ensure effective usage and timely data updates at the ground level.








DATA MIGRATIONS, CORRECTIONS AND PHOTO RESIZING

The data migration from Child MISS to Homelink DIGI is completed. Data corrections and photo resizing were done to ensure a smooth transition, optimize performance and enhance user experience for long-term benefits.

The DIGI features 350 Power BI templates that visually present data through charts and graphs, providing insights for strategic planning and effective service execution.






HOMELINK MOBILE APP

The data reflects the number of children who received institutional care during the financial year 2024–25, including both newly admitted and previously institutionalized children.

A total of 8,366 children received institutional care services through 45 Networking Partners of the Homelink Network. These services were provided by the Child Care Institutions, including Children's Homes, Open Shelters, Fit Facilities, and Reception Units etc.



Note: These data have been collected manually as the Child MISS web portal was discontinued, and the newly developed Homelink DIGI portal was still under development and maintenance. The development of DIGI was delayed due to challenges in data migration and other technical issues. The data was gathered from the Nodes through emails and telephone calls and verified by the Hub Coordinators. These data will soon be reflected in the Homelink DIGI.




SNIPPETS











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ANIMATIONS ON YAR CAMPAIGN 'FAMILY IS WHERE I BELONG'




FLIPBOOKS



















HOMELINK BOOKLET



This document emphasizes the network's growth, technological advancements and collaborative efforts to foster a data-driven culture.

Designed to engage with NGOs and like-minded organizations to foster partnerships to expand the network's reach for greater impact through data-driven decision-making practices. This collaboration aims to enhance efforts in reducing cases of missing children and ensuring their safe reunification with families, and further advocate on child rights issues.



HOMELINK WEBSITE

The YaR Homelink website (homelink.in) has been developed to serve as the central platform for Homelink DIGI. Through this website, users can securely log in and access various services of Homelink DIGI. This initiative enhances accessibility and streamlines digital operations within the network.



LONG-TERM PLAN FOR HOMELINK

The DB YaR Forum has developed a long-term strategic plan for the Homelink Network to ensure Homelink DIGI's sustainability, spanning to two phases of over six years. The plan aims to revolutionize digital –




documentation for the nonprofit. It empowers partner organizations with a technology-driven framework for efficient data management and decision-making. The integration of Homelink DIGI into grassroots initiatives will function as a bridge to fill the digital gap while aligning with Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs). This initiative fosters a child-friendly, resource-accessible environment and enables technology for social impact.



DEVELOPMENT OF DATA PROTECTION POLICY

The Data Protection Policy was drafted and presented at the Annual Governing Members (AGM) Meeting and receiving strong support for responsible data management. A dedicated working committee was formed. The Committee proposed to include an expert to refine and strengthen the policy. DB YaR is committed to establish a framework that maintains –



ethical data handling and safeguard norms. It will guide secure data management by ensuring the safety and dignity of data principals while underlining a trustworthy system.



VISIT BY HUB COORDINATORS AND NATIONAL DIRECTOR: TRAINING, PLANNING AND MONITORING

Hub Coordinators conducted 113 visits to nodes, training data managers and staff on Homelink DIGI, updates and reporting. These included capacity-building on documentation, use of media and digital tools and other issues. Additional visits addressed staff training, improving data quality, quantity, analysis and visualization, ensuring a smoother and more effective implementation.

The Homelink National Director made 15 visits to regional offices and organizations, engaging with teams on training, planning and monitoring. These visits focused on capacity building, addressing challenges in data management, strengthening the network and facilitating the teamwork.













HOMELINK NATIONAL TRAINING

The Digital Innovation for Enhanced Documentation Training Programme was held from 20-22 January 2025 at Don Bosco Media House, Trichy. Organized by Don Bosco YaR Forum, Delhi, and hosted by Trichy Province. The program brought together 33 participants to enhance documentation and decision–making using Homelink DIGI.

The training covered Suitable Development Goals, resource mobilization, data visualization, proposal drafting, mini-research preparation, and the impact of Al. It also addressed the rapid penetration of digitalization and the emerging challenges. The program emphasized collaboration, innovation and data-driven approaches to create sustainable solutions for the welfare of at-risk youth and their families.











HUB HOMELINK DIGI TRAINING AT HUB LEVEL

The Homelink National Team conducted training sessions across eight regions to enhance the adoption of the Homelink DIGI. These sessions provided hands-on demonstrations of the web tool, mobile app and Power BI reports, showcasing their role in improving workflows. Discussions also covered the Digital Personal Data Protection (DPDP) Act, 2023. The act brings protection against misusers of digital data and preventions. This becomes an important aspect of data collection and reporting thus applying minimum data collection practices and key features were discussed. Recognizing the need for a data protection policy for YaR Forum, so inputs were gathered from

centres to draft the policy.

A total of eight training sessions were held nationwide, benefiting 73 organizations and 277 participants. Government officials and child welfare collaborators also attended gaining first-hand insight into the DIGI tool's impact.









NODE HOMELINK TRAINING FOR DATA ENTRY MANAGERS

Hub Coordinators conducted 94 hands-on training sessions for the nodes. These trainings were focused on data entry and Homelink DIGI utilization. Participants found the tool interactive and beneficial. However, some features required further customization to meet diverse organizational needs. Overall, the training enhanced operational efficiency and adoption of the Homelink DIGI.





ORIENTATION FOR SALESIANS AND LAITY JOINING YAR FORUM

In July 2024, a three-day orientation for 45 Salesians and staff members were inducted to facilitate YaR works and services to serve the needy children and vulnerable communities. The session introduced Homelink DIGI, highlighting its role in streamlining documentation. A demonstration was conducted to showcase how DIGI enhances data management and enables real-time reporting.









ORIENTATION AND CAPACITY BUILDING ON ALTO CHILDREN

To empower underprivileged children, especially in villages and small cities with limited internet access, the network initiated Al awareness and capacity-building sessions. These sessions introduced emerging technologies and their impact and digital advancements, helping children adapt to the evolving digital landscape. These orientations were designed interactive, emphasising sharing ideas, understanding children's expectations and experiences with digital platforms and Al, and discussing the pros and cons of Al and social media use from the children's perspective. The Hub Coordinators were trained to discuss these with children on these topics in advance and with a collaborative effort to gather insights and make it participatory while focusing on the development of digital literacy. A total of 17 orientations were conducted, and 1179 individuals aged 14 and above benefited.











CAPACITY BUILDING OF CIVIL SOCIETY MEMBERS/ NGOS ON HOMELINK DIGI

To strengthen the network and spread the reach for creating a large network, not limited to only the Institutions, the DB YaR Forum initiated the gathering of the civil society and like-minded organizations working for children to protect their rights. The Hub Coordinators conducted seven training sessions for 256 civil society members. These sessions focused on child rights, recent developments and Homelink DIGI fostering partnerships. This training united civil society members to create a collaborative network through the Homelink Network to protect children's rights.





NODE-LEVEL TRAINING BY HUB COORDINATOR

The Hub Coordinator worked closely with nodes and centers to demonstrate and improve the use of Homelink DIGI. A total of 68 training sessions were held, providing 269 staff members with essential skills. Additionally, support was offered for daily documentation and social audits.










ONLINE TRAINING OF HUB COORDINATORS

The 60 nodes were registered and deployed Homelink DIGI, including four newly joined organizations, expanding the Homelink Network. The Homelink team provided hands-on training and support to ensure smooth onboarding and effective system implementation at the grassroots level.




TRAINING ON DATA INSIGHTS

Mr. Raj Parit conducted a Data Insights training, simplifying complex data into stories for better decisions. Using a one-page format with 4-6 charts ensure accessibility for planning and interventions.

Hub Coordinators tested modules and fields, provided feedback, and refined key service indicators, ensuring Homelink DIGI met fieldlevel needs through gap analysis and restructuring.

10 MONTHLY MEETINGS




CAPACITY BUILDING ON CHILD SAFEGUARDING










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
